# The Impact of COVID-19 on People with Disabilities

The COVID-19 pandemic and efforts to slow its spread have brought several social, economic, and overall health impacts for communities nationwide. <u>Early in the pandemic, people from disabled communities faced challenges such as increased barriers to healthcare, information, and support systems.</u> The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (<u>CDC</u>) <u>states</u>, "most people with disabilities are not more likely to become infected with or have a severe illness from COVID-19. However, some people with disabilities might be more likely to get infected or have a severe illness because of underlying medical conditions, congregate living settings, or systemic health and social inequities."

Over time, COVID-19 continues to highlight gaps in accessibility for people with disabilities. As states ease vaccine requirements and mask mandates, companies phase out flexible work policies, and federal funding for pandemic-response measures wane, millions of people who are vulnerable to COVID-19 due to a disability, are urging government officials to make permanent systematic changes to help make employment, healthcare, housing, social environments, and schooling more accessible for all. For example, according to a 2022 "Data For Progress" survey, 57% of disabled people believe masks should be required on public transportation, and 64% think masks should be required on planes.

"All we're really asking for is for a masking policy that will allow us to be able to go to the store, to go to the doctor, go get the mail, without risking our health. One-way masking does not work, and no one seems to care outside of our community " - <u>Jay Justice, Director of LGBT HQ</u>

Researchers predict that the number of disabled people in the U.S. will increase as more people get infected with the virus. According to a <u>2022 study released by the CDC</u>, one in five adults under 65 who had COVID is experiencing at least one health condition that could be considered long COVID. In addition, as the number of people infected with the virus increases, so will the number of survivors coping with post-COVID conditions. If you or someone you care for are at <u>higher risk</u> of getting very sick from COVID-19, <u>take steps to prevent getting sick</u>.
