Strategies to Move beyond COVID-19: Recovering Routine Immunization Rates

COVID-19 has negatively impacted routine immunization rates across the United States. The onset of the covid-19 pandemic led families to skip well-child visits and delay routine vaccinations. Experts say that we will be coping for years with the impacts of delayed medical care during the height of the pandemic.

"In 2021 alone, 25 million children missed at least one essential vaccine and 18 million children received no vaccines at all. Our action on immunization in the years leading to 2025 will shape how the story of the pandemic is written. If we fail, we will see tragedies like unprevented cervical cancer and increased child mortality, leading to more deaths in generations that should have been living longer. " - Director of the Department of Immunization, Vaccines and Biologicals at WHO - March 2023

The US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has developed a 2021-2025 National Strategic Plan to "provide a roadmap for federal and non-federal partners and stakeholders for strengthening vaccination infrastructure across public and private sectors, including improving immunization and health equity." Unfortunately, despite the significant benefits of vaccines, the Center for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) states that "at least three out of every four adults are missing one or more routinely recommended vaccines."

Below are a few tips on how to get up to date on your vaccines.

- 1. Reach out to your doctor/ pediatrician:
- Be prepared with some questions to ask, including: Which vaccines do I (or my child) need to catch up on? How many doses of each vaccine are we missing?
 Will catching up require multiple appointments?
- 2. Check out the CDC's catch-up schedule for recommended vaccinations:
- The advisory committee on immunization Practices <u>provides a list of</u> <u>recommended vaccines</u> that guide immunization schedules for children, adolescents, and adults.

3. Financial Assistance:

 The <u>"Vaccines for Children" (VFC) Program</u> helps secure vaccines for children when parents or guardians are uninsured or underinsured. Ask your child's pediatrician for more information.

4. Save vaccination records:

- Ask your vaccine provider for an immunization record form or download and
 use this form. Bring this record with you to health visits and ask your vaccine
 provider to sign and date the form for each vaccine you receive. That way, you
 can be sure that the immunization information is current and correct.
- If your vaccine provider participates in an <u>immunization registry</u>, ask that your vaccines be documented there as well.
