

Charlotte County, Florida

According to the 2010 Census, Charlotte County had the second-highest median age of any U.S. county with a population of more than 100,000 people at 55.9. Its county seat is Punta Gorda, Florida, and also includes the unincorporated towns of Port Charlotte and Englewood. Port Charlotte was named to Forbes' list of 25 Best Places to Retire in both 2015 and 2017. Charlotte County has a primary care health shortage for their low-income population, a dental health care shortage for their low-income population, and a mental health shortage for their low-income population (Port Charlotte). The climate is warm year-round, with a high of 75 in January (low of 50) and a high of 92 in July (low of 74). In Charlotte County, 81% of the population has adequate access to locations for physical activity. In 2018, Charlotte County was recognized as a Healthy Weight Community Champion.
