Lee County, Florida

Lee County has the largest population in Area 8. Its largest cities include Cape Coral, Lehigh Acres, Fort Myers, Bonita Springs, North Fort Myers, and Estero. Its county seat is Fort Myers. The cost of living in Lee County is slightly higher than the state average. Lee County has a primary health care shortage for its low-income populations in Bonita Springs, Fort Myers, Cape Coral, North Fort Myers, and Lehigh Acres. Lee County also has a dental health care shortage and a mental health care shortage for the low-income population. In 2018, the City of Sanibel was recognized as a Healthy Weight Community Champion. In 2019, Business

Insiders ranked Cape Coral 24th out of the 50 happiest cities in America. The climate remains warm year-round, with a high of 75 in January (low of 54), and a high of 92 in July (low of 75).
